Modules

Module 701 – Theatre for Young Audiences: Approaches to Performance

This module occupies the first 15 weeks of the course and acts as a foundation for the programme. During this time, you will explore and develop the skills needed to perform and create theatre for a range of ages. Alongside core classes in voice, movement, singing, and acting, you will examine how younger audiences shape and inform the work made by artists working in TYA. There is an emphasis on collaboration and the blending of skills. Some of the work will be shared with MA Actor-Musicianship and MA Collaborative Theatre Making students, allowing you to explore how music and the notion of musicality can inform the way we create and perform for, by, and with children and young people.

Module 702 – Languages of Performance

This module runs alongside the skills and project modules, aiming to equip you with the knowledge to become a critically engaged and reflective practitioner through diverse modes of writing and documenting practice. Teaching focuses on experimenting with alternative approaches to writing for and about theatre and live art, distinct from the conventional academic essay or book. The module also introduces you to theories of practice research processes as you test and develop your own sense of yourself as a performer, actor, and theatre-maker.

Module 703 – TYA in Performance

This module involves creating a series of projects with your peers that test and develop your ability to devise and perform theatre for, by, and with children and young people. Projects vary from Early Years devised work to sensory theatre for audiences with complex needs, and collaborative work for older audiences. Each project explores how processes and performances are shaped by the perspective of the target audience, and all are led by our specialist staff and industry guests. Projects are performed in a variety of settings, including schools, community spaces, and theatre venues.

Module 700 – Independent Research Project

This module, the culmination of the Masters programme, offers the opportunity to develop and articulate your own area of specialist interest. It is anticipated that, through exposure to different performance-based practices and your own writing and research over the course of the programme, you will have identified particular areas of professional interest. Each student submits an individual proposal for this module, and once accepted, a personal supervisor will be appointed to support the project. The project is manifested through both practical and written presentation.
