

# WELCOME TO THE MONTHLY LIBRARY NEWSLETTER

Welcome to the start of a new school year, especially to all our new pupils who have found their way into our lovely library. The Library has become a wonderful hub for children who want to read, work, practise lines or singing and every morning before tutor time it is awash with the younger pupils working with their Maths Buddies and Year 8 supervisors. We are so very lucky to have such a space for our school family to use.

Many of our classes in the Prep department have had a short library familiarisation session with me so that they know where to find books and magazines and how to borrow and return books. We are also continuing with the weekly story reading to pupils in Years 3 and 4. Year 3 will start with shorter stories before we move on to a longer text. Year 4 voted overwhelmingly for me to read *Harry Potter and the Philosopher's Stone* and you could hear a pin drop in our sessions - even on the carpet! Year 2 will also continue with their visits to the Big Library for a story or two in term time, and there is a rumour that children from The Nursery may come along for a visit. Watch this space.

We shall continue to set aside Tuesday and Thursday lunchtimes for quiet reading and work so that those who need a break from the hustle and bustle of school life can be guaranteed a place of peace and quiet.

Just a quick reminder about lost or damaged books or books that are not returned - any books that come back to The Library that have been badly damaged whilst in a child's care or which have not been returned by the end of term will incur a charge in the end of term account. Children get regular reminders about overdue books. If parents are charged for a missing or overdue book at the end of term, the charge will still stand even if the book is found at a later date. If parents prefer, they can buy a brand new copy of the missing or damaged book for The Library instead of incurring the charge.

# The Official Opening of Our Big Friendly Library

We were incredibly lucky to have author Catherine Johnson visit us on 19th September to give a talk to pupils in Years 5 - 8 and then run a fantastic creative writing workshop for some of the older pupils. Catherine was then our guest of honour in the official opening of The Library and cutting of the ribbon. It is said you should never meet your heroes, but I disagree. Catherine was wonderful with the children, fascinating to listen to and brilliant at getting the older pupils to write some really interesting text. She spoke about her family history and being of mixed race, how she was disorganised at school and received a poor history report only to go on to be an amazing writer of historically based novels for children and young adults. Her question and answer session with the pupils in Years 5 - 8 eventually had to be curtailed after 20 minutes, such was the enthusiasm of her audience to find out more about her. We do stock a number of Catherine's books in The Library, but I am delighted to say that most of these are already out on loan.








# **BOOK REVIEW**



# Read a book, read a book, read a book...

Maddie Styles has been reading the Alex Rider series by Anthony Horowitz and particularly enjoyed *Crocodile Tears.* The plot goes like this: A charity broker con artist has raised millions of dollars in donations, only to invest them in a form of genetically modified com that has the power to release an airborne strain of virus so powerful it can knock out an entire country in one windy day. A catastrophe so far-reaching that it would raise millions of dollars more in charitable donations, all of which would be embezzled by one man. The antidote? Alex Rider, of course, who survives gunfire, explosions, and hand-to-hand combat with mercenaries - just another day in the life of an average kid (The Book Trust). Maddie says, "Inside this book there is A LOT of action and adventure. It is a book from a series (Alex Rider), and this is for people who like explosions, fighting and nerve-wracking cliff hangers! In my opinion, Alex Rider is the best character – a misunderstood school boy who wants nothing more than to lead an ordinary life...But, instead, he finds himself fighting enemies, travelling to different countries and still having to do his homework! I would rate this book 5 out of 5 stars because even if you don't like reading long books, the first six books in this series are available to read in graphic novel form as well as in normal books."


# Recommended reads for this month


The Girl Who Speaks Bear (what an intriguing title) by Sophie Anderson has been recommended by Saskia Wells for 11+ readers. Found abandoned in a bear cave as a baby, Yanka has always wondered about where she is from. She tries to ignore the strange whispers and looks from the villagers, wishing she was as strong on the inside as she is on the outside. But, when she has to flee her house, looking for answers about who she really is, a journey far beyond one that she ever imagined begins: from icy rivers to smouldering mountains meeting an ever-growing herd of extraordinary friends along the way. Saskia found this really interesting especially how Yanka finds out who she is and why she was left in a cave. It's such a great story. Thank you, Saskia.

Sky Song by Abi Elphinstone has been recommended by Izzy Holden. Izzy says this a really good story and a great adventure. She liked the characters and the descriptive language and it was easy to read and enjoy. The story: In the snowy kingdom of Erkenwald, whales glide between icebergs, wolves hunt on the tundra and polar bears roam the glaciers. But the people of this land aren't so easy to find - because Erkenwald is ruled by an evil Ice Queen and the tribes must stay hidden or risk becoming her prisoners at Winterfang Palace. Join Eska, a girl who breaks free from a cursed music box, and Flint, a boy whose inventions could change the fate of Erkenwald forever, as they journey to the Never Cliffs and beyond in search of an ancient, almost forgotten, song with the power to force the Ice Queen back. This is a story about an eagle huntress, an inventor and an organ made of icicles. But it is also a story about belonging, even at the very edges of our world . . . Thank you, Izzy.

# Recommended reads continued

Two books by Onjali Q. Rauf have really appealed to Alejandra Cilleruelo Rivera: The Boy at the Back of the Class and The Night Bus *Hero*. Alejandra liked that one was about being a refugee and the other about a boy who behaves badly, but turns his life around. Both books were really interesting and adventurous. In *The Boy at the Back* of the Class one ordinary nine-year-old child and three classmates are full of empathy for Ahmet, a boy that comes to their school as a refugee from Syria (he is the boy at the back of the class). Through their sensitivity, curiosity, ingenuity, bravery and innocent niceness, they make a massive impact on Ahmet's life, friends, class, school, community and wider world. The Night Bus Hero is a story told from the perspective of a bully. "I've been getting into trouble for as long I can remember. Usually I don't mind 'cos some of my best, most brilliant ideas have come from sitting in detention. But recently it feels like no one believes me about anything - even when I'm telling the truth! And it's only gotten worse since I played a prank on the old man who lives in the park. Everyone thinks I'm just a bully. They don't believe I could be a hero. But I'm going to prove them all wrong... This book explores themes of bullying and homelessness, while celebrating kindness, friendship and the potential everyone has to change for the good. # **WORTH A LOOK!**

Some of the children have expressed interest in reading biographies and autobiographies of sportswomen and sportsmen so below are a few suggestions:

II+ (although some book reviews suggest it is suitable for younger groups)

Jonny: My Autobiography by Jonny Wilkinson

Jonny Wilkinson's career has crossed three decades and four World Cups. He has accumulated phenomenal achievements, world points records, an impressive list of broken body parts, and a drop goal that will be remembered for ever. But the peculiar calmness with which he played the game masked a very different reality. In *Jonny*, he reveals the extraordinary psychology that he had to tame in order to be able to dominate his sport. For most of his life, he was driven by a guest for perfection and an obsession to be the best player in the world; here he shows how these two facets of his competitive mind took such a hold of him that they sent him to the top of the world, then swept him up and dragged him down into a spiral of despair, lonny's career has spanned the far reaches: amazing highs and iconic moments, then a fight against injury that culminated in a battle with depression. Here he tells of the physical toll he knew his body was taking from rugby, even from his youth; he tells of how he never wanted to be a kicking fly-half but learned to adapt his natural game to play the style that Clive Woodward believed necessary to win a World Cup, and how he nearly walked out on Martin Johnson's England team 13 years later.

Changing the Game: Fantastic Female Footballers by Casey Stoney Discover the history of the women's game and meet the individuals that have overcome the odds to play the sport they love. From historical figures such as Lily Parr, who defied the government ban on women's football, to contemporary record-breakers such as Marta, and rising stars set to take the game to new heights, this book is packed with fascinating figures. With beautiful illustrations, inspirational stories, player skills and statistics, and Casey Stoney's motivational voice throughout, this is a great book especially for those looking for sporting heroes.

As poet Connie Wanek alludes to in her afterword - a lively dialogue with former US Poet Laureate Ted Kooser - sometimes the simplest sights and sounds "summon our imaginations" and cry out to be clothed in the alchemical language of poetry. This compendium of the fleeting and unexpected turns the everyday - turtles, trees, and tadpoles; cow pies, lazy afternoons, and pillowy white marshmallows - into poetic gold. A brilliant and timeless collaboration that evokes both the mystery and grandeur of the natural world and the cozy, mundane moments of daily life.

# Can You Tickle a Tiger? by Bobbie Brooks

Can you tickle a tiger, or a bear, or even a crocodile? And can you tickle them before they tickle you? This is a playful and brightly coloured board book featuring some of the best jungle animals. With felt trails to follow with your finger and lots of funny rhyming words, this sturdy, robust book is light to hold, perfect to pick up, play with and read.

# 2 - 3 years

# I Am Happy by Michael Rosen

Have you heard? This puppy is happy – so happy, it feels like dancing the waltz, doing somersaults, laughing out loud – and even climbing on a cloud! This terrifically uplifting read-aloud is the third in a series from Michael Rosen for children to explore certain emotions and find ways to express themselves. A note from Michael Rosen at the beginning encourages readers to explore their own imagination to find what makes them happy and celebrate these feelings. It has a simple rhyming text in large font to make it accessible and is accompanied by bold and expressive illustrations that capture the most joyful ways that you can show happiness.

# 4 - 5 years

# Are You a Monster? by Guiherme Karsten

Warning! This book contains a monster. A really angry, really scary, really bad monster... or so the monster says. And Monster has a very important question: are you a monster too? See, there is a very long checklist to determine if you are indeed a big, scary monster. Do you have a long pointy tail? Big yellow eyes? No? Wait, can you make a big, loud noise? You can! Oh no... you might just be a monster! Eek! This is a wonderful and fun read-aloud story with plenty of movements, noises, and questions that will have children of all ages roaring and stomping along, as Monster encourages them to be the scariest monster possible. The illustrations are simple and eye-catching and will keep even the little ones enthralled.

# 5 - 8 years

Dadaji's Paintbrush by Rashmi Sirdeshpande

Discover that bereavement can be a beginning, not an ending, in this beautiful story of one boy's grief when he loses his beloved grandfather. Dadaji loves to teach others to paint, especially his grandson. But after Dadaji passes away, the boy can't bear to use the favourite paintbrush his grandfather left for him. When a little girl knocks on the door, the boy discovers how many lives Dadaji touched with his art, and finds a way to continue his legacy.

# 6 - 10 years

Our Tower by Joseph Coelho

This magical story follows three children living in a tower block, as they embark on a fantastical adventure which helps them see their home in a new light. This story is a celebration of, and a reclaiming of tower blocks as a place where magic and adventure can happen. It's a modern-day fable that shows the children of a tower block travelling to a strange, magical world inside a tree and meeting an old man with supernatural powers, only to realise that the magic they'd been looking for had been in their tower all along.

The Lizzie and Belle Mysteries: Drama and Danger by J. T. Williams Perfect for fans of Robin Steven's *Murder Most Unladylike*. Set in eighteenth-century London, it has all the fun and zest of Hamilton and is inspired by real Black British historical figures. Twelve-year-olds Lizzie Sancho and Dido Belle are from different worlds – Lizzie lives in Westminster in her dad's tea shop, while Belle is an heiress being brought up by her aunt and uncle at grand Kenwood House – but they both share a love of solving mysteries. And when their eyes meet in the audience of the Drury Lane theatre one night, both girls are sure they've seen something suspicious on stage. Lizzie and Belle soon find themselves on the trail of a mystery – and becoming best friends. But can they work out what's going on in time to prevent a murder?

The Mighty Odds by Amy Ignatow

What do you get when you mix a sci-fi nerd, a cartoonist, a social outcast, and the most popular girl in school with a mysterious bus crash? Some very specific superpowers: Martina can change her eye colour; Nick can teleport four inches to the left; Farshad can develop super strength, but only in his thumbs; and Cookie can read minds, when those minds are thinking about directions. They are, in short, the just okayish heroes. Starring a diverse group of kids with (very limited) superpowers, this series' multiple narrators make for a quirky, pitch-perfect read that tackles identity and stereotypes.

# Musical Truth: A musical history of modern Black Britain in 28 Songs by leffrey Boakye

This thorough and inspiring selection of 28 songs carefully chosen by Jeffrey Boakye to represent Modern Black Britain isn't just a must-listen playlist — it's a history book in a league of its own, offering a unique new perspective on postcolonialism and exploring Black identity in the UK. Boakye's knowledge and passion shines through as he explains the background, emotional impact, and historical significance of songs that changed British culture forever — from *London is the Place for Me* by Lord Kitchener to *Vossi Bop* by Stormzy. Topics such as racism, structural oppression, and sexism are addressed through the lens of work by artists such as Musical Youth, Sade, Dave, and even Ed Sheeran, and each musician is stylishly characterised in a pop-art monochrome print by visual artist and designer Ngadi Smart.
