# WELCOME TO THE MONTHLY LIBRARY NEWSLETTER

One thing we should never compromise on is spending time reading to our children, even if it is only for 10 minutes per day. 'Books allow children to hear new vocabulary and new ways of putting words together, which expands their ability to make sense of and use language.' (Laura Philips PsyD, the Child Mind Institute).

Children are never too young or too old to be read to and there are so many benefits:

- it expands their vocabulary
- it helps them understand texts an essential tool for education and life
- it helps children to develop empathy
- it helps children to learn how to deal with their own feelings through reading about characters who experience emotions like anger and sadness
- it gives you and your child a time of peace and calm and time to connect to each other
- it helps to benefit a child's cognitive development especially when they are very young. Even holding a book in their hands helps a child's brain development
- research is showing that reading actual books appears to be more beneficial than reading e-books because the younger generation in particular, is used to scrolling and swiping, whereas reading an actual book encourages slower, deeper reading and a greater understanding of the text.

Also, if children see their parents and members of their home community reading, they will be encouraged to read themselves. ('Why it is important to read to your child' by Hannah Sheldon-Dean)

We are incredibly lucky to have a huge number of books in the school for all age groups so please do read to your child when they bring a book home and talk to them about the story or pictures.



Jonny: My Autobiography by Jonny Wilkinson Jonny Wilkinson's career has crossed three decades and four World Cups. He has accumulated phenomenal achievements, world points records, an impressive list of broken body parts, and a drop goal that will be remembered for ever. But the peculiar calmness with which he played the game masked a very different reality. In *IONNY*, he reveals the extraordinary psychology that he had to tame in order to be able to dominate his sport. For most of his life, he was driven by a quest for perfection and an obsession to be the best player in the world; here he shows how these two facets of his competitive mind took such a hold of him that they sent him to the top of the world, then swept him up and dragged him down into a spiral of despair. Jonny's career has spanned the far reaches: amazing highs and iconic moments, then a fight against injury that culminated in a battle with depression. Here he tells of the physical toll he knew his body was taking from rugby, even from his youth; he tells of how he never wanted to be a kicking fly-half but learned to adapt his natural game to play the style that Clive Woodward believed necessary to win a World Cup, and how he nearly walked out on Martin Johnson's England team 13 years later.



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

# The Lizzie and Belle Mysteries: Drama and Danger by J. T. Williams

Lizzie Sancho and Dido Belle come from very different walks of life. Lizzie lives with her large family in their tea shop in the heart of busy London. Dido is a lonely heiress living with her aunt and uncle in a mansion near Hampstead Heath. But when they catch each other's eyes at the theatre one night, each is delighted to see another Black girl her own age. And when Lizzie's actor father is nearly killed by a falling chandelier, they both know it wasn't an accident. They team up, making notes and following suspects - until they're plunged into terrible danger themselves. Can Lizzie and Belle navigate their new friendship, and stop the would-be murderer? Packed with atmosphere and charged with tension, this is a hugely enjoyable mystery set in the dangerous Georgian era. It was particularly dangerous if you were Black, and this is explored in an age-appropriate way. The support and passion within the Black community (and Lizzie's own family) is brilliantly depicted, shot through as it is with sadness about their brothers and sisters who are still in slavery. Yet there is hope and joy and love too.


Impossible Creatures by Katherine Rundell A boy called Christopher is visiting his reclusive grandfather when he witnesses an avalanche of mythical creatures come tearing down the hill. This is how Christopher learns that his grandfather is the guardian of one of the ways between the non-magical world and a place called the Archipelago, a cluster of magical islands where all the creatures we tell of in myth live and breed and thrive alongside humans. They have been protected from being discovered for thousands of years; now, terrifyingly, the protection has worn thin, and creatures are breaking through. Then a girl, Mal, appears in Christopher's world. She is in possession of a flying coat, is being pursued by a killer and is herself in pursuit of a baby griffin. Mal, Christopher and the griffin embark on an urgent quest across the wild splendour of the Archipelago, where sphinxes hold secrets and centaurs do murder, to find the truth - with unimaginable consequences for both their worlds. Together the two must face the problem of power, and of knowledge, and of what love demands of us.




# Read around the World

An Unusual Princess by Wu Meizhen






From West Africa: 9 - 11 years Koku Akanbi and the Heart of Midnight


- 1. She lives in a motel, not a big house.

It will take all of Mia's courage, kindness and hard work to get through this year. Will she be able to hold on to her job, help the immigrants and guests, and go for her dreams?



### 3-5 Years

The Little Cat by Hiba Noor Khan

Inspired by a true story, *The Little War Cat* is a moving tale of hope amidst conflict. It follows the story of a little grey cat who is caught up in the BANGS and CRASHES of the humans in boots, who have changed the city of Aleppo she knew so well into one that's harder to recognize. She is roaming the streets looking for food and shelter when an unlikely friend appears. He shows her that kindness is still there when you look for it, and soon the little grey cat knows exactly what to do to made a difference herself.

Stubby: A true story of friendship by Michael Foreman Stubby was a brave soldier, a loyal friend... and a dog. The Cat at the Wall by Deborah Ellis

On Israel's West Bank, a cat sneaks into a small Palestinian house that has just been commandeered by two Israeli soldiers. The house seems empty, until the cat realizes that a little boy is hiding beneath the floorboards. Should she help him? After all, she's just a cat. Or is she? It turns out that this particular cat is not used to thinking about anyone but herself. She was once a regular North American girl who only had to deal with normal middle-school problems: staying under the teachers' radar, bullying her sister and the uncool kids at school, outsmarting her clueless parents. But that was before she died and came back to life as a cat, in a place with a whole different set of rules for survival. When the little boy is discovered, the soldiers don't know what to do with him. Where are the child's parents? Why has he been left alone in the house? It is not long before his teacher and classmates come looking for him, and the house is suddenly surrounded by Palestinian villagers throwing rocks, and the sound of Israeli tanks approaching. Not my business, thinks the cat. And then she sees a photograph, and suddenly she understands what happened to the boy's parents, and why they have not returned. And as the soldiers begin to panic, and disaster seems certain, she knows that it is up to her to diffuse the situation. But what can a cat do? What can any one creature do?
