





Taking refuge in watching the world around him and all the comings and goings of the fair, he develops a Sherlock Holmes-style talent for observation. But when he witnesses the murder of Professor Wollestonecraft, even his detective skills can't help him when the folk of the fair decide that he must be the guilty party. Soon, Wild Boy is on the run, along with young circus acrobat Clarissa. Together, the pair must use all of their unusual talents to avoid the police, solve the clues and discover the identity of the real killer - the sinister hooded man, Set in 1840s London, this is a pleasingly pacy and atmospheric historical romp.





However, Anja and Monika's activities are drawing suspicion from the Stasi – the much-feared East German state secret police. Soon they are under close surveillance. Disaster strikes one night and both girls are thrown into great danger. There is a strong suggestion of betrayal in the air and the girls feel they are unable to trust anyone.





strikes again?










8+ Sisters by Raina Telgemeier

Read a book, read a book, read a book...

Pegasus and the New Olympians by Kate O'Hearn has been devoured by Bertie Fieldhouse, who has already enjoyed the first two books in this series by brilliant author Kate O'Hearn, who visited us last June. Bertie writes: "This is the third book in a series, so to understand the text you should read books I and 2. This fantasy book combines technology and mythology. This adventure has danger at every turn! I really love the fact that the main character is continuously torn between the world we live in and understand and a magical kingdom full of weird and wonderful creatures which, as the reader, you'll grow to love. I hope you'll enjoy this book of action." Thank you, Bertie.

Niki Chae chose a gripping title to review *The Beast and the Bethany* by Jack Meggitt-Phillips. A gentleman of over 500 years old keeps a beast in his attic. If he gives the beast anything he wants to eat, the beast will give him presents and a potion to keep him forever young. Here's how Niki describes this action adventure that is partly fantasy and sometimes a little spooky: "There's a man called Ebenezer and he gives a beast whatever the beast likes to eat and so Ebenezer gets what he wants. But, one day, the beast asks Ebenezer for a child. Ebenezer says 'no' but had to say 'yes' because he had wrinkles around his eyes and goes to get one and finds Bethany." Niki gave this title 5 out of 5 stars. Thank you, Niki.

Recommended reads for this month

Running on the Roof of the World by Jess Butterworth has been recommended by Luca Aguna Turner who describes it as a great adventure which jumps backwards and forwards. There is a plot twist at the end and it's very exciting... Tash and her best friend Sam have grown up used to following the rules in occupied Tibet. But when a man sets himself on fire as an act of protest, Tash barely escapes after her house is raided and her parents are arrested. She, Sam and their two yaks set out on a dangerous journey across the Himalayas to reach India and the Dalai Lama, who she hopes will be able to save her parents. Thank you, Luca.

I would like to recommend a Barrington Stoke title for the II+ reader. (Barrington Stoke titles are short books in a format that is designed for the dyslexic reader, but they are also great stories for the more reluctant reader who does not find it easy to engage with longer texts.) *The Mystery of Me* by Karen McCombie is aimed at II+ readers. It is a story of self discovery and dealing with trauma. It is a heart-warming story with a nice 'reveal' at the end. The story is about Ketty 'who had a terrible accident and was technically dead for two minutes and thirty-nine seconds according to the doctors who saved her. She's on the mend yet can't remember anything about her life before the accident. But people are treating her really weirdly and Ketty just can't shake the feeling that something is terribly wrong.'

0 - 3 years

Peekaboo Santa by Camilla Reid

Easy-to-use peekaboo sliders, a funny rhyming text and surprise mirror ending combine in this stylish and interactive board book for babies and toddlers! With a total of 10 smooth mechanisms to push, pull or turn on every spread this beautiful book is packed full of fun!

The Nose, Toes and Tummy book by Sally Nicholls

This is your nose. What happens when I press it? BEEP! What a noisy nose! This charming book talks directly to the baby listening, as the adult presses their nose, smells their feet and kisses their tummy. It focuses on specific body parts, and then culminates in the adult using their arms to hold the baby tight and love them from top to toe. The final word is 'Goodnight', ideally meaning the baby goes to sleep feeling loved, after many giggles.

Written with gentle humour and much warmth, this is infused with love for tiny people. Various different adults and babies are depicted throughout in an inclusive way, so that many families can feel represented.

Maths Words for Little People 6 book set (Shapes, Sorting, Counting, Sums, Time, Money by Helen Mortimer

This series of little books builds children's confidence with mathematical vocabulary and ideas and provides a foundation for learning in a way that feels good.

Roald Dahl's Opposites by Roald Dahl

Busy little hands can lift the flaps to discover the opposites with iconic illustrations of Dahl's much loved characters from the one and only Quentin Blake. This sturdy board book is the perfect first baby book to introduce titchy toddlers to the world of Roald Dahl.

Sparkle - Go - Seek Farm by Katie Button

Who goes moo? Who goes baa? Who goes neigh? Who goes bok? There are farm animals hiding under the lift-the-flaps in this fun, interactive board book. Just lift each flap and go seek! With shiny foil under each lift-the-flap, the simple words encourage the reader to 'sparkle go seek' under each flap to discover the sparkly farm animal picture underneath. Thick card pages and sturdy flaps are easy to turn and lift and make this book perfect for little ones and first readers who love interactive and imaginative play.

0 - 3 years continued

I'm the Bin Lorry Driver by Oxford Children's Books

It's time to hop aboard the bin lorry and follow a day in the life of a bin lorry driver! This entertaining and interactive picture book invites you to jump into the driver's seat, so strap on your seatbelt and away you go. From putting on the right gear and pulling the right levers to tipping all the recycling at the lorry's end destination, children are immersed in the action of the job. The lovely bold illustrations and text are laid out in a way that emphasizes the action and fun – there's a dashboard at the bottom of the page so children can pretend to operate the wheel, press the buttons and pull the gears. Along the way, there are also various text prompts to encourage early learning skills like counting, colour recognition and basic shapes.

3 - 6 years

Mine! A Story of not Sharing by Klara Persson

Nico is coming over to play, but Sally doesn't want him to touch her toy squirrel. Or her train. Not her parking garage either. Sally's mum said to put the things she doesn't want to share in the wardrobe. As it turns out, there are quite a lot of things Sally doesn't want to share - including her mum. This fresh and funny approach to sharing shows just how complicated hiding all the things you love can be. In the end, it might be easier to give sharing a try. Maybe. Kids will find the whole concept a hoot and will come away understanding that greed isn't actually that good.

The Winter Wish by Helen Mortimer (a festive picture book) William lives in Words of Wonder, a perfect bookshop full of stories and delights. He has always lived there with his family, ever since he was a baby, and now he is thirty-seven books tall. But times are hard, and the bookshop is struggling, so William takes it upon himself to create the most beautiful Christmas window to draw people in — with a leaping reindeer, pulling a sleigh full of stories. And then one night, as Christmas draws near, the reindeer comes to life and all William's wishes for his family and all the shops around come true . . . making a Christmas to remember through the power of words and hope.

3 - 6 years continued

Corner by Zo-O

A crow finds itself in an empty corner and begins to make the space its own. First, it furnishes the corner with a bed, a bookshelf, a rug, even a potted plant. In the newly decorated space, the crow reads and eats, listens to music and waters the plant, but something's missing. What is it? The crow decides to decorate more, drawing geometric patterns on the walls in yellow. The corner is filled with colour and shapes, but something is *still missing*. The crow adds a window, and finally discovers what it needed all along - a way to connect with the world outside and to make a new friend. This highly original, almostwordless picture book is the first title by award-winning Korean author and illustrator Zo-O to be published in English. Soft, detailed illustrations of the cozy corner will inspire kids to express themselves in their own spaces, and the crow's problem-solving skills encourage readers to think about how they can comfortably step outside of their comfort zone.

The Tree and the River by Aaron Becker

In an alternate past - or possible future - a mighty tree stands on the banks of a winding river, bearing silent witness to the flow of time and change. A family farms the fertile valley. Soon, a village sprouts, and not long after, a town. Residents learn to harness the water, the wind, and the animals in order to survive and thrive. The growing population becomes ever more industrious and clever, bending nature itself to their will and their ambition: redirecting rivers, harvesting lumber, reshaping the land, even extending daylight itself. . .

My Strange Shrinking Parents by Zeno Sworder

One boy's parents travel from far-off lands to improve their son's life. But what happens next is unexpected. What does it mean when your parents are different? What shape does love take? And what happens when your parents sacrifice a part of themselves for you? In this heartbreaking and heart-warming story, CBCA award-winner Zeno Sworder reflects on his own migrant parents' sacrifices to create a universal story about what it means to give to those you love. Drawing from the sacrifices his Chinese mother made to raise her young family in a small country town, Sworder's drawings are full of beautiful detail and fairytale settings that explore his own journey from child to parent. With humour and pathos, Sworder reflects on the strange nature of giving and receiving love and celebrates those parents who embrace a hard life for themselves in the hope of a better life from their children.

The Skull: A Tyrolean Folk Tale by Jon Klassen

In a big abandoned house, on a barren hill, lives a skull. A brave girl named Otilla has escaped from terrible danger and run away, and when she finds herself lost in the dark forest, the lonely house beckons. Her host, the skull, is afraid of something too, something that comes every night. Can brave Otilla save them both? Steeped in shadows and threaded with subtle wit - with rich, monochromatic artwork and an illuminating author's note - *The Skull* is as empowering as it is mysterious and foreboding, but is also a tale of sweet friendship.

Bunny and Tree by Balint Zsako

A gorgeous wordless adventure story about a rabbit and a tree, their surprising friendship, and the distance they go to find a place to call home. Bunny and Tree first meet when the tree observes a ferocious wolf threatening the bunny and comes to its protection. From that moment on, there is a bond of trust between the two, which flowers not only into friendship, but amazingly, into a road trip adventure, when Bunny, who's looking for his rabbit friends, convinces Tree that it's time to uproot and see the world. Compelled by sympathy and a shared purpose, Bunny and Tree hit the road, becoming another tremendous and memorable picture book odd couple. Depicted in bright colours in a world of lavish skies and so much to see, Bunny and Tree share in wonder, adventure, misadventure, solidarity, and a sense of homecoming.

Noah's Gold by Frank Cottrell Boyce

Being the smallest doesn't stop you having the biggest ideas. Eleven-year old Noah sneaks along on his big sister's geography field trip. Everything goes wrong! Six kids are marooned on an uninhabited island. Their teacher has vanished. They're hungry. Their phones don't work and Noah has broken the internet. There's no way of contacting home ... Disaster! Until Noah discovers a treasure map and the gang goes in search of gold.

The Phantom Tolbooth by Norton Juster

Milo's extraordinary voyage takes him into such places as the Land of Expectation, the Doldrums, the Mountains of Ignorance and the Castle in the Air. He meets the weirdest and most unexpected characters (such as Tock, the watchdog, the Gelatinous Giant, and the Threadbare Excuse, who mumbles the same thing over and over again), and, once home, can hardly wait to try out the Tollbooth again. But will it be still there when he gets back from school?

Axel and Beast: The Grabbem Getaway by Adrian C. Bott

One elite gamer. One shape-shifting robot. Unlimited adventure! One day, Axel is playing video games when something HUGE breaks into his garage. It's a robot. His name is BEAST. And he's on the run from the nasty Grabbem Industries, who want BEAST back – right now! Axel has no idea that he and BEAST will soon be best friends and go on the wildest adventures you could imagine. BEAST is no ordinary robot, and Axel isn't your usual gamer. But are they awesome enough together to escape from BEAST's evil creators?

Crocodile Attack by Justin D'ath

When the robber who has kidnapped Sam Fox and his two-year-old cousin Nissa crashes his car into the Crocodile River, Sam struggles to protect himself and Nissa from the danger all around them.

The Song Walker by Zillah Bethel

When a young girl wakes up in the middle of the desert, she has no idea who she is. She's wearing one shoe, a silky black dress, and she's carrying a strange, heavy case. She meets Tarni, who is on a mysterious quest of her own. Together, the two girls trek across the vast and ever-changing Australian Outback in search of answers. Except both are also hiding secrets...

Mwikali and the Forbidden Mask by Shiko Nguru

I 2-year-old Mwikali is moving to a new school in Nairobi and just wants life to be normal. But when she meets Soni, Odwar and Xirsi who reveal that she is descended from an ancient bloodline of legendary Kenyan warriors, all hope of a normal life fades. Now, with an array of malign forces massing, Mwikali must delve deep into the past to discover her ancestry, learn to harness her extraordinary powers, and enter a race against time to defeat a village elder who has turned to dark magic in an effort to gain ultimate power...

Einstein the Penguin by Iona Rangeley

When the Stewart family visit London Zoo one winter afternoon, Imogen and Arthur are enthralled by a small, inquisitive penguin named Einstein. As they leave, Mrs Stewart jokingly tells him that penguins are always welcome at their house. However, they are astounded when he turns up on their doorstep later that evening, clutching a small rucksack stuffed full of silver herrings, a Polaroid camera and a selection of photographs. They attempt to alert the zoo, but are met with disbelief, so do what anyone would in the circumstances and invite him to stay. Although Einstein cannot speak, they communicate through a series of grunts and gestures, and discover that he is on a rescue mission. Can they help him complete his quest before the mysterious man in a wide-brimmed hat catches up with them? While Imogen enjoys honing her investigative skills, Einstein gives Arthur the confidence to overcome his shyness and make a new friend.

Readers will laugh out loud at the family's hilarious attempts to integrate Finstein into their household.

Our Castle by the Sea by Lucy Strange

Growing up in a lighthouse, I I-year-old Pet's world has been one of storms, secret tunnels, and stories about sea monsters. But now the country is at war and the clifftops are a terrifying battleground. Pet will need to muster all her bravery to uncover why her family is being torn apart. This is the story of a girl who is afraid and unnoticed. A girl who freezes with fear at the enemy planes ripping through the skies overheard. A girl who is somehow destined to become part of the strange, ancient legend of the Daughters of Stone.
