

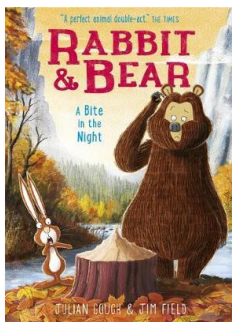

In the meantime, we hope you enjoy browsing our highlights of the newest books hitting bookshops this spring.

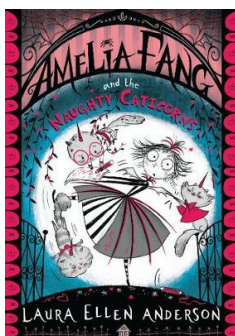

by Julian Gough

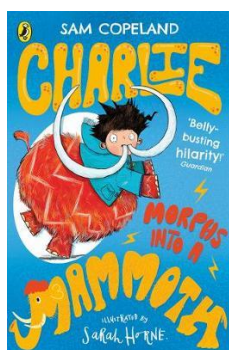
A beautifully illustrated and funny story about a bear and a rabbit who discover that things are always better when shared with a friend. Perfect for children moving on from picture books.

A brand-new title in the bestselling, gorgeously gothic and wickedly funny Amelia Fang series.



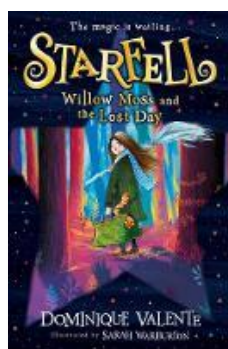
Charlie Morphs into a Mammoth by Sam Copeland

Evie and the Animals by Matt Haig

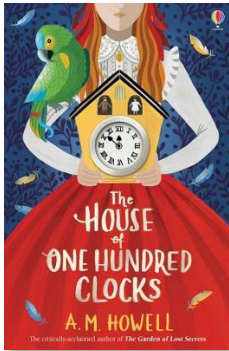
A wonderful story about Evie, a girl who uses her talent to talk to animals to solve a thrilling mystery.

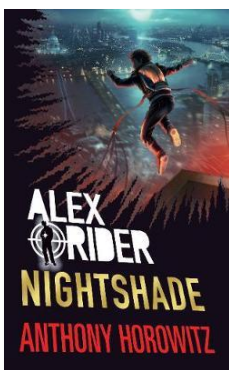
The House of One Hundred Clocks by A.M. Howell

The Highland Falcon Thief by M.G. Leonard & Sam Sedgman

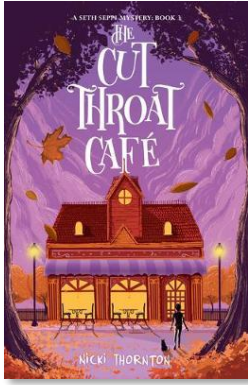

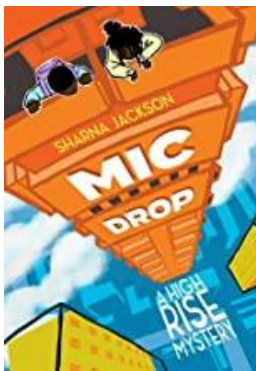
Three years after Alex Rider's last adventure, Anthony Horowitz has written another high-octane adventure for his teenage spy.

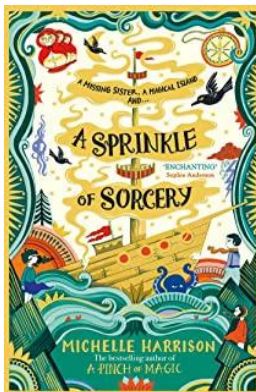
The third magical murder mystery in the bestselling Seth Seppi series, which started with *The Last Chance Hotel!*

A Sprinkle of Sorcery by Michelle Harrison

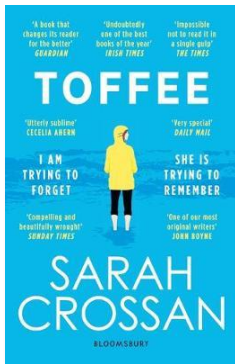

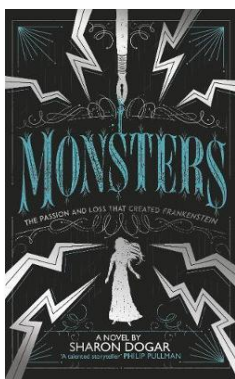

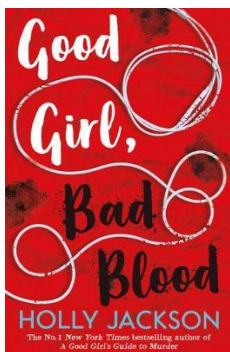
Toffee by Sarah Crossan

Monsters: The Passion and Loss That Created Frankenstein by Sharon Dogar

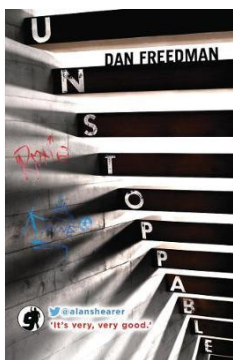
The incredible story of the teenage Mary Shelley and the events in her life which inspired her to write *Frankenstein*.
