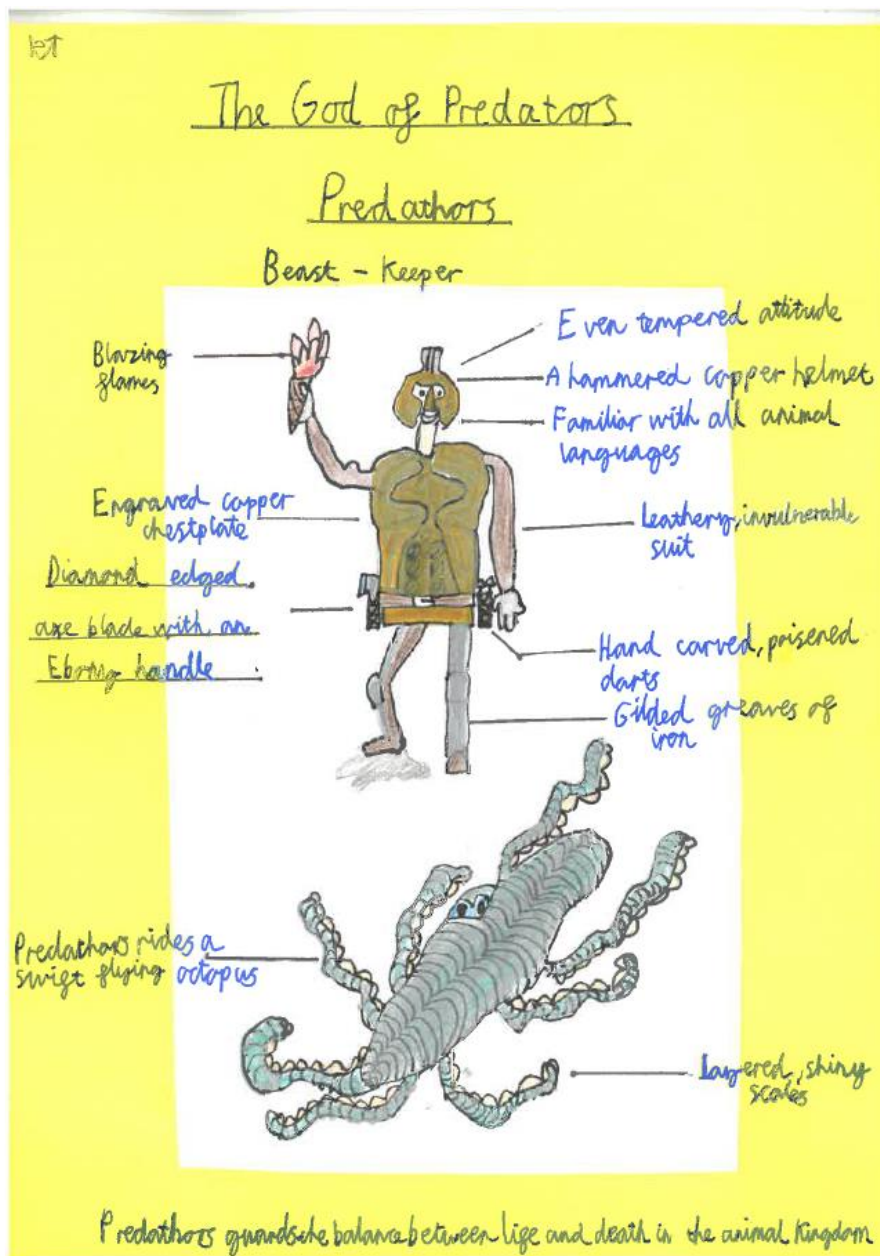


# Year 6 English
